Key context to consider

- Large, three-form entry primary school (699 pupils on roll and 110 staff).
- High numbers of EAL (87%) and INA impact on communication with and understanding of parents / carers
- Very high level of anxiety within the community about transmission of coronavirus

Community population have a number of risk factors in terms of virus transmission and impact:

- o Mostly black, Asian and ethnic minority families
- o Multi-generational families in same household including older relatives (70+)
- o Families living in overcrowded conditions
- High rate of pregnancies
- Largely low income families
- o Many families with multiple siblings attending different settings and different year groups within same setting.

Pupils and staff should return to school as soon as they can, in line with guidance for People with COVID-19 and their contacts.

01.04.22 – <u>Symptoms of Covid-19 in adults has been</u> updated to include a wider range

The following guidance for <u>'People with symptoms of a respiratory infection including Covid-19'</u> will be followed in full.

Respiratory infections can spread easily between people. It is important to be aware of symptoms so you can take action to reduce the risk of spreading your infection to other people.

The symptoms of Covid-19 and other respiratory infections are very similar. It is not possible to tell if you have Covid-19 flu or another respiratory infection based on symptoms alone. Most people with Covid-19 and other respiratory infections will have a relatively mild illness, especially if they have been vaccinated.

If you have symptoms of a respiratory infection, such as Covid-19, and you have a high temperature or you do not feel well enough to go to work or carry out normal activities, you are advised to try to stay at home and avoid contact with other people, until you no longer have a high temperature (if you had one) or until you no longer feel unwell.

In some cases, you might continue to have a cough or feel tired after your other symptoms have improved, this does not mean that you are still infectious.

Staff and pupils only return to school following a negative test result or full isolation period – monitored through SAM by HR/Finance officer and staff absence team for staff and by attendance team for pupils.

26.02.22 — Staff and pupils may return to school following a negative PCR result or having followed latest public health advice related to isolating following a positive PCR test result — at least 5 full days and then until they have received 2 negative LFD test results on consecutive days.

	Although many people will no longer be infectious to others after 5 days, some people may be infectious to other people for up to 10 days from the start of their infection. You should avoid meeting people at higher risk of becoming seriously unwell from Covid-19, especially those whose immune system means that they are at higher risk of			



	serious illness from Covid-19, despite vaccination, for 10 days after the day you took your test. If you have a positive Covid-19 test result, it is very likely that you have Covid-19 even if you do not have any symptoms. You can pass on the infection to others, even if you have no symptoms. Those formerly considered to be clinically extremely vulnerable

Following expert clinical advice and the successful rollout of the COVID-19 vaccine programme, people previously considered to be particularly vulnerable, clinically extremely vulnerable (CEV), and high or higher-risk are not being advised to shield again.

Staff, children and young people who were previously identified as being in one of these groups are advised to continue to follow <u>Guidance for people previously</u> considered clinically extremely vulnerable from COVID-19.

Staff, children and young people over the age of 12 with a weakened immune system should follow <u>Guidance for people whose immune system means they are at higher risk from COVID-19.</u>

Staff, children and young people previously considered CEV should attend school and should follow the same COVID-19 guidance as the rest of the population.

In some circumstances, staff, a child or young person may have received personal advice from their specialist or clinician on additional precautions to take and they should continue to follow that advice. Whilst individual risk assessments are not required, employers are expected to discuss any concerns that people previously considered CEV may have.

Employers will need to follow this specific <u>guidance for pregnant employees</u>. <u>COVID-19 vaccination: a guide for women of childbearing age, pregnant or breastfeeding contains further advice on vaccination. Your workplace risk assessment should already consider any risks to female employees of childbearing age and, in particular, risks to new and expectant mothers. You should also consider the needs of pregnant pupils.</u>

and as soon as practicable following changes in guidance, circumstance or health of individual. It is the individual's responsibility to inform their line manager and / or SLT if their circumstances or health change or if they have any concerns or feel additional measures are needed. This has been communicated with all staff and is revisited as part of risk assessment reviews.

Individual risk assessments are not completed for all staff who are BAME (unless there are other vulnerability factors in addition to this) as such a high number of staff are BAME additional protective measures are included within the whole school risk assessment for all. An individual risk assessment will be completed with any BAME staff who feel one is needed or would be helpful and this has been communicated with all staff.

04.01.22 – Overview of individual risk assessments has been updated to include all new staff who have been identified as vulnerable and following changes in circumstance for some existing staff. Reviews have been completed for autumn 1st and 2nd half term and will continue to be reviewed as outlined above.

07.01.22 – 'Joint Union advice on medically vulnerable and higher risk groups' has been issued for January 2022 along with advice from NAHT. This has been shared with all senior leaders and will be referred to and taken into account when reviewing individual risk assessments in January 2022. Senior leaders will review individual risk assessments for CEV staff and line managers will review for all other staff identified as vulnerable or living with someone CEV.

26.02.22 – Whilst individual risk assessments are not required, they will be reviewed and updated at the start of spring 2nd half term in line with latest changes to government guidance. Line managers and senior leaders responsible for completing and / or reviewing individual risk assessments will be provided with the latest government and HSE guidance to refer to prior to



Employers should be able to explain the measures they have in place to keep staff safe at work. The Health and Safety Executive (HSE) has published guidance on protecting vulnerable workers, including advice for employers and employees on how to talk about reducing risks in the workplace. Employers should discuss concerns with staff.

01.04.22 - People at higher risk of becoming seriously unwell from a respiratory infection, including Covid-19, include:

- Older people
- Those who are pregnant
- Those who are unvaccinated
- People of any age whose immune system means they are at a higher risk of serious illness
- People of any age with certain long-term conditions

The success of the Covid-19 vaccination programme has meant that the requirement for shielding and identifying people as clinically extremely vulnerable (CEV) is no longer necessary. However, there remains a smaller number of people whose immune system means they are at higher risk of serious illness from Covid-19, despite vaccination.

Enhanced protections, such as those offered by specific treatments, and / or additional vaccinations alongside other protective behaviours may benefit these individuals – as outlined in the <u>guidance on this link</u>.

these discussions. Individuals will be asked to confirm, as part of these reviews whether they would prefer to continue with half termly reviews of their individual risk assessment or only have a review moving forwards annually and / or if there is a change in their circumstances, they have concerns or they feel further support is needed. An annual review will be triggered by school and any other review would need to be requested by the individual from their line manager or a senior leader.

01.04.22 – All individual risk assessments were reviewed in the spring 2nd half term and the overview has been updated to reflect changes in circumstance for some staff, any new staff who has been identified as vulnerable and to include individual preference for the frequency of risk assessment reviews moving forwards (ranging from half termly to annually). All risk assessments will continue to be reviewed if there are changes in guidance (triggered by school) or in personal circumstance (triggered by the individual).

Latest <u>Joint Union guidance</u> and national guidance (outlined in the bullet points to the left) specific to those who may be more medically vulnerable will be shared with all line managers and senior leaders prior to risk assessment reviews for the Summer 1st half term.

This guidance will also be shared with all staff so they can inform themselves about personal decisions where applicable.

All individual risk assessments will be reviewed at the start of the summer 1st half term due to the significant changes in guidance nationally.

	Respiratory infections are common in children and young people, particularly during the winter months. Symptoms can be caused by several respiratory infections including the common cold, Covid-19 and RSV. For most children and young people, these illnesses will not be serious, and they will soon recover following rest and plenty of fluids. Children and young people with mild symptoms such as a runny nose, sore throat or slight cough, who are otherwise well, can continue to attend their education setting. Children and young people who are unwell and have a high temperature should stay at home and avoid contact with other people, where they can. They can go back to school and resume normal activities when they no longer have a high temperature and they are well enough to attend. All children and young people with respiratory symptoms should be encouraged to cover their mouth and nose with a disposable tissue when coughing and / or sneezing and to

Some meetings with teachers will take place face-to-face where there is adequate space and ventilation for the number of adults present. Staff are supported to wear face coverings where requested or needed. Pupils usually remain in class bubbles inside where possible with the exception of lunch times when years 1 to 6 eat within the dining hall as a year group but seated at tables as a class – with some movement of pupils around the hall. Additional measures in place to reduce risk of transmission without detrimental impact on education or welfare of pupils / staff

26.02.22 – Following changes in national guidance and government guidance for schools this risk assessment will be reviewed at least once per half term moving forwards (from 24.02.22) and more frequently as needed (in response to changing circumstances, increasing cases and / or updated guidance from either the government, DfE, Public Health or the LA).

The following are in addition to any measures outlined above, have been communicated with stakeholders and are reviewed regularly (at least fortnightly once per half term) to see whether a step-up or step-down is needed in light of any known cases within school and impact on provision (for pupils), wellbeing (for pupils and staff) or workload (for staff). Manchester Test and Trace, the Local Authority, Governors and other relevant parties will be contacted prior to any 'step-up' in measures – as outlined in the Outbreak Management Plan below.

- Wearing of face coverings by adults (visitors and staff) within communal areas and whilst moving around school is recommended and strongly encouraged however is optional, unless directed within an outbreak management plan or as part of an agreed enhanced response or a 'step-up' in measures. Staff and pupils should follow wider advice on face coverings outside of school, including on transport to and from school.
- Staff and parents / carers are strongly encouraged to have both all vaccines available to them and any boosters offered and are provided with information, reminders and support to do so. Staff are supported in attending through authorisation of paid appointments during working hours if requested and necessary following the usual school procedure on SAM.
- Staff have been asked to share their vaccine status as part of measures to inform contact tracing / isolation following known confirmed cases within school and to identify and support those staff who may be at increased risk or more vulnerable. This is optional for all staff and the information is kept securely in line with data protection. This information can only be accessed by senior leaders who are responsible for responding to confirmed cases and the school's HR/Finance officer and will only be kept whilst needed or until all staff are fully vaccinated.
- One-way system in place for drop-off and pick-up and parents/carers encouraged and reminded to wear face coverings for this for at least the first
 two weeks back in September. Reviewed week beginning 13.09.21 and decision made to end one-way system from 20.09.21 unless needs to be
 reinstated as part of Outbreak Management plan. Communicated to all staff, parents / carers and pupils on 17.09.21. Following measures in place to
 reduce risk of transmission whilst one-way system not in place:



- o Families encouraged to only have one adult dropping-off / picking-up children to reduce numbers on site
- Adults encouraged to wear face coverings for drop-off and pick-up unless exempt
- o Families encouraged not to spend longer than essential on site for drop-off and pick-up
- Adults asked to maintain social distancing from those they don't live with whilst on site
- Parents / carers not to enter the school building (unless an appointment has been arranged for a specific reason)
- o If parents / carers need to speak with staff this is done outside and maintaing social distance
- Parents / carers asked to leave space around classroom doors and staff and not gather in large groups where possible
- o CEV staff to remain inside the classroom and at least 2 metres from parents / carers who must remain outside where outlined in their individual risk assessment as a reasonable adjustment and / or supportive measure to reduce risk of transmission
- e If staff feel they are needed, visors and / or face coverings can be worn when welcoming / dismissing children at the door
- e If needed, cones / barriers / signage can be introduced to create a space around classroom doors which parents / carers must remain outside of.
- Parents / carers not permitted entry to the building without a prior appointment and where possible are met outside.
- No trips involving coaches or other travel other than foot within local area are taking place currently. This will remain in place for the spring 2nd half term. Trips and visits requiring coaches and other travel can be booked for the summer term. Trips and visits, including using coaches and public transport, can now be booked and go ahead in line with usual risk assessment processes and procedures (which must be followed in full by all staff). Relevant measures in relation to Covid-19 must be outlined within risk assessment documentation as needed.
- Singing to only take place outdoors with the exception of EYFS (in small groups with ventilation).
- Restricted sharing of resources / equipment between bubbles.
- Teachers able to choose whether to organise their classrooms in rows or not and whether to have carpet spaces or not in their own classrooms.
- PE to take place outdoors or in classroom in bubbles until at least the end of the autumn 1st half term 2021. Following review in the autumn 2nd half term, some indoor PE has resumed in line with class bubbles. Windows and doors to be opened for ventilation and only one class at a time.
- Staggering of break and lunch times.
- Visitors are only by prior appointment and reduced to essential.

Attendance update

School attendance is mandatory for all pupils of compulsory school age and it is a priority to ensure that as many children as possible regularly attend school.

Where a child is self-isolating (awaiting a test result) or in quarantine because of COVID19, they should be recorded as code X (not attending in circumstances related to coronavirus). Where they are unable to attend because they have a confirmed case of COVID-19 they should be recorded as code I (illness).

For pupils abroad who are facing challenges to return, code X is unlikely to apply. In some specific cases, code Y (unable to attend due to exceptional circumstances) will apply. Further guidance about the use of codes is provided in the school attendance guidance.

01.04.22 – Schools no longer need to record pupils who do not attend for reasons related to Covid-19, using Code X. Pupils with symptoms of Covid-19 are no longer advised to get a test, and most of the scenarios that this category was brought in to record no longer apply.



Pupils who have symptoms of Covid-19 should follow the <u>UKHSA guidance</u> about when they should stay at home. Where a pupil is not attending because they have symptoms of Covid-19 or have had a positive test, schools should record this using Code I (Illness) unless another more appropriate absence code applies. Schools can continue to use the sub-code (I02) to record illness due to suspected Covid-19, although they are not required to.

Vulnerable pupils update

Where pupils who are self-isolating are within our <u>definition of vulnerable</u>, it is very important that you put systems in place to keep in contact with them, particularly if they have a social worker. Some children may be vulnerable who are not officially in statutory systems and schools should seek to support any children who they believe may have challenging circumstances at home.

When a vulnerable pupil is self-isolating, you should:

- notify their social worker (if they have one) and, for looked-after children, the local authority virtual school head
- agree with the social worker the best way to maintain contact and offer support.

You should have procedures in place to:

- check if a vulnerable pupil is able to access remote education support,
- support them to access it (as far as possible),
- regularly check if they are accessing remote education,
- · keep in contact with them to check their wellbeing and refer onto other services if additional support is needed.

School meals

You should continue to provide free school meal support to any pupils who are eligible for benefits-related free school meals and who are learning at home during term time. More information on <u>providing school meals during the COVID-19 pandemic is available</u>.

Educational visits

Educational visits should be subject to risk assessments as normal and reflect any public health advice or in-country advice of the international destination. General guidance on educational visits is available and is supported by specialist advice from the Outdoor Education Advisory Panel (OEAP).

You are advised to ensure that all bookings have adequate financial protection in place. You should speak to either your visit provider, commercial insurance company, or the risk protection arrangement (RPA) to assess the protection available. Independent advice on insurance cover and options can be sought from the British Insurance Brokers' Association (BIBA) or Association of British Insurers (ABI).

Wraparound provision and extra-curricular activity

More information on planning extra-curricular provision can be found in the guidance for providers who run community activities, holiday clubs, after-school clubs, tuition and other out-of-school provision for children.

01.04.22 - Close contacts of someone who has had a positive test result for Covid-19

People who live in the same household as someone with Covid-19 are at the highest risk of becoming infected because they are most likely to have prolonged close contact. People who stayed overnight in the household of someone with Covid-19 while they were infectious are also at high risk.



If you are a household or overnight contact of someone who has had a positive Covid-19 test result if can take up to 10 days for your infection to develop. It is possible to pass on Covid-19 to others, even if you have no symptoms.

You can reduce the risk to other people by taking the following steps:

- avoid contact with anyone you know who is at higher risk of becoming severely unwell if they are infected with Covid-19, especially those whose immune system means they are at higher risk of serious illness from Covid-19, despite vaccination
- limit close contact with other people outside your household, especially in crowded, enclosed or poorly ventilated spaces
- wear a well-fitted face covering made with multiple layers or a surgical face mask if you do need to have close contact with other people, or you are in a crowded place
- wash your hands frequently with soap and water or use hand sanitiser.

If you develop symptoms of a respiratory infection try to stay at home and avoid contact with other people and follow the guidance for people with symptoms.

If you are in contact with someone with Covid-19 but do not live with them or did not stay in their household overnight, you are at lower risk of becoming infected. There is guidance on protecting yourself and others in living safely with respiratory infections, including Covid-19.

Children and young people who usually go to school, college or childcare and who live with someone who has a positive Covid-19 test result should continue to attend as normal.

How to reduce the spread of infection with the people you live with, if you have Covid-19

If you have Covid-19, there is a high risk that others in your household will catch if from you. There are several things you can do to reduce the spread of infection in your household.

- 1. Limit close contact with others. Spend as little time as possible in communal areas.
- 2. Regularly clean frequently touched surfaces and shared rooms like kitchens and bathrooms.
- 3. Wash your hands regularly using soap and water, particularly after coughing and sneezing.
- 4. Get help where possible from those you live with. Ask for help with cleaning and being brought food safely to avoid unnecessary contact.
- 5. Use a face covering if you need to spend time in shared spaces.
- 6. Keep rooms well ventilated.
- 7. Catch coughs and sneezes in disposable tissues and put them straight in the bin.

Children and young people who may be more vulnerable to serious illness from Covid-19

Children and young people can continue to attend education settings unless their clinician has advised otherwise. Where a child receives specific guidance from a medical profession, the school will seek further advice and support to inform an individual risk assessment for the child. This will be shared with parents / carers and relevant staff within school.



When settings should consider extra action

The <u>operational guidance</u> sets out the measures that all education settings should have in place to manage COVID-19 risk day-to-day. For most settings, it will make sense to think about taking extra action if they face severe operational disruption to face-to-face education.

The thresholds, detailed below, can be used by settings as an indication for when to seek public health advice if they are concerned. For most education and childcare settings, these include:

- a higher than previously experienced and/or rapidly increasing number of staff or student absences due to COVID-19 infection
- evidence of severe disease due to COVID-19, for example if a pupil, student, child or staff member is admitted to hospital due to COVID-19
- a cluster of cases where there are concerns about the health needs of vulnerable staff or students within the affected group.

Where further measures are needed these should be considered in line with government guidance (<u>Contingency Framework: Education and childcare settings</u>), LA guidance and the school's Contingency / Outbreak Management Plan (outlined below).

01.04.22 - Government guidance, 'Contingency Framework: Education and childcare settings' has now been withdrawn and replaced with, 'Emergency planning and response for education, childcare and children's social care settings' alongside updates to, 'Health protection in education and childcare settings'.

Our Contingency / Outbreak Management Plan (as outlined below) continues to remain in place and can be referred to and implemented as needed in response to changing circumstances, level or risk and guidance. Where school is considering implementation of further measures, advice will be sought from the LA, public health, Manchester Test and Trace etc. as needed and governors will be informed.

<u>Health protection in education: Chapter 4: Action in the event of an outbreak or incident outlines that an outbreak or incident may be defined in epidemiological terms as:</u>

- an incident in which 2 or more people experiencing a similar illness are linked in time or place
- a greater than expected rate of infection compared with the usual background rate for the place and time where the outbreak has occurred

These definitions should not be taken as a threshold for reporting or action. School will follow relevant guidance for when to seek help or report infections in our setting and will continue to report all confirmed cases of Covid-19 to the LA via their online monitoring form at least weekly.

Contingency / Outbreak Management Plan

Outbreak Management Plan (OMP) outlines how the school would operate if additional measures are recommended for your setting or the local area. The Director of Public Health, Public Health England Health Protection Teams or the Local Authority could recommend certain measures are re-introduced. This may happen to help manage outbreaks in schools, or if there is an "extremely high prevalence" of Covid-19 in the community and other measures have failed to reduce transmission, or as part of a package of measures "responding to a variant of concern".

Whilst there are some groups where cases are likely to continue rising, it is likely that the Omicron wave has now peaked nationally. There remains significant pressure on the NHS but hospital admissions have stabilised, and the number of patients in Intensive Care Units (ICU) remain low and are falling.
